Choose the Right School for You

While every neighborhood school in PSD offers a high-quality education and a variety of classes, we know you may want to choose a school outside your attendance area for a specific program or option. There are several ways for students in PSD to prepare for a two-year or four-year college experience and get a running start on a postsecondary degree by earning multiple college credits at little to no cost to students or their families.



Accelerating Students through Concurrent Enrollment (ASCENT): Students who earn nine postsecondary credits in high school are eligible to spend the year after 12th grade taking in-state college courses tuition-free.



Advanced Placement (AP): Students can take AP classes with college-level rigor during their high school years and earn college credit through AP exams. In 2023-24, 438 PSD students earned honors based on their AP exam performance.



Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID): This program helps raise the achievement and chances of college success for underrepresented students through increased support and rigorous expectations.



Associate Degree Pathway: Highly motivated students can earn an associate degree from Front Range Community College while still in high school without having to pay tuition.



Concurrent Enrollment: Earn college credits by taking college courses in your high school with teachers who are credentialed to teach for the college or on a college campus.



International Baccalaureate (IB): Earning an IB Diploma involves completing rigorous IB courses, a community service project, and a lengthy essay. Students can take IB exams to earn 24 college credits.



Pathways in Technology Early College High Schools (PTECH): Colorado authorizes just 20 PTECH programs in the state to help high school students earn experience in high-demand fields. Students who spend five or six years in Poudre High's PTECH program can earn an associate's in advanced manufacturing.



Teacher Recruitment Education & Preparation (TREP): Use a fifth and sixth year of high school to take college courses tuition-free for future educators.

Participate in career tours, internships, job shadowing, resume building, capstone projects, and more to gain credits and on-the-job experience, network with potential employers, and learn what it's really like to work in different industries before committing to a college major or job pathway. Work-based learning opportunities also include:

Apprenticeships – PSD's apprenticeship opportunities recently expanded thanks to a state grant. Student apprentices earn credit, wages, and real-world experience while making connections with local employers.

Capstone Project – Complete a project based on what you've learned in class with the aid of a local mentor.

Credit-for-work – Earn high school credit for working a part-time job.

Alternative Cooperative Education (ACE) - Students, including students identified as special populations, experience developmentally appropriate career programming.

Collaboration Among Many Promotes Universal Success (CAMPUS) - Students 18-21 receiving Integrated Services support travel to Colorado State University twice a week to build independent living skills and explore opportunities in the community.

Community Connections – Students 18-21 with significant learning needs work on foundational skills to help them transition from high school to adult living.

Cooper Home – Students ages 18-21 receiving Integrated Services support learn work-related skills, prepare for independent living, learn to navigate agency services, and build daily living and social skills.

Project SEARCH – Students in their final year of receiving Integrated Services support learn work-related skills, prepare for independent living, learn to navigate agency services, and build daily living and social skills.

School to Work Alliance Program (SWAP) - Young people ages 15-24 with mild to moderate employment barriers work to become job ready through work-based learning, career exploration, learning how to write resumes, and more.
